U-TURNS

While on a recent RV outing, a group of us self-described experts discussed and offered opinions and solutions on a myriad of topics and issues one evening. One of the topics that was discussed was that all motorcycles are going to be dropped sooner or later no matter the skill level of the rider. My most embarrassing drop was in the middle of the road while doing a U-turn, so I will relate to that experience and offer suggestions on how to do a U-turn.



It may look easy, but a smoothly executed U-turn on a motorcycle can be challenging. So, how do you perform a U-turn that looks effortless? Remember that we are riding big motorcycles and turning using counter-balancing on a touring motorcycle requires more finesse and skill than doing a U-turn on a smaller lighter motorcycle and of course, trikes and slings. I've discussed counter-balancing before but basically, it is a turning method used at slow speeds where you shift your weight and turn the handle bars the direction you want to turn. So, now that we know that it is harder to do a U-turn on a large motorcycle, how do we do it?

First find an area where a U-turn can be safely executed. That means an area with no traffic and plenty of room. A Walmart parking lot would do nicely. Next, the old adage "You'll go where you're looking" holds especially true when it comes to U-turns. That said, don't look down, and keep your line of vision going **through** the turn, constantly focusing your eyes ahead, where you want to go, rather than towards the pavement below. Use the friction zone of the clutch, not the throttle, to control the bike's speed. The friction zone is the area where your clutch is slipping enough to transmit some, but not all power from the engine to the rear wheel. Don't try to U-turn in neutral, and don't do it with a gear fully engaged. Riding within the friction zone will give you more control over the bike using a constant throttle, which helps modulate the motorcycle's lean angle through subtle clutch adjustments.

Avoid using the front brakes during U-turns, as the forks are more sensitive to diving at low speeds. Just like trail-braking in high speed turns, gentle dragging of the rear brake creates stability, enabling better control while you're maneuvering your bike through the turn. There's a natural tendency to stick your leg out when you turn, but your motorcycle will be more manageable when the peripheral mass (ie, you!) is closer to the bike. Keep your feet on the pegs. Counter balancing in a slow turn requires that you put more weight on the outside peg.

Consider these tips and practice them in the safety of an empty parking lot. For whatever reason, most people find it much easier to make tight turns in one direction. To develop a more balanced U-turn skill set, practice doing figure 8s in an empty parking lot. Similarly, try riding in a wide circle and narrowing your path so you're forming an ever-narrowing spiral; once you can't turn any more tightly, exit and try it again the other way. Remember to keep looking where you want to go, especially when you're changing directions.

Easy-Peasy! It just takes a little practice so next time we get off course, everyone can make the U-turn safely and effortlessly.

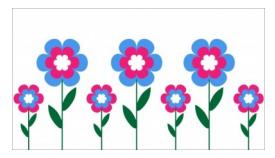

Potluck Baked Beans

(2) large cans (28 ounces each), or (4) small cans (15 ounces each), baked beans of your choice

2/3 cup sweet barbecue sauce or ketchup

(1) tablespoon Dijon Mustard

1/2 teaspoon hot pepper sauce, or more to taste (optional)

Dash of ground cumin or chili powder (optional)

Dash of black pepper

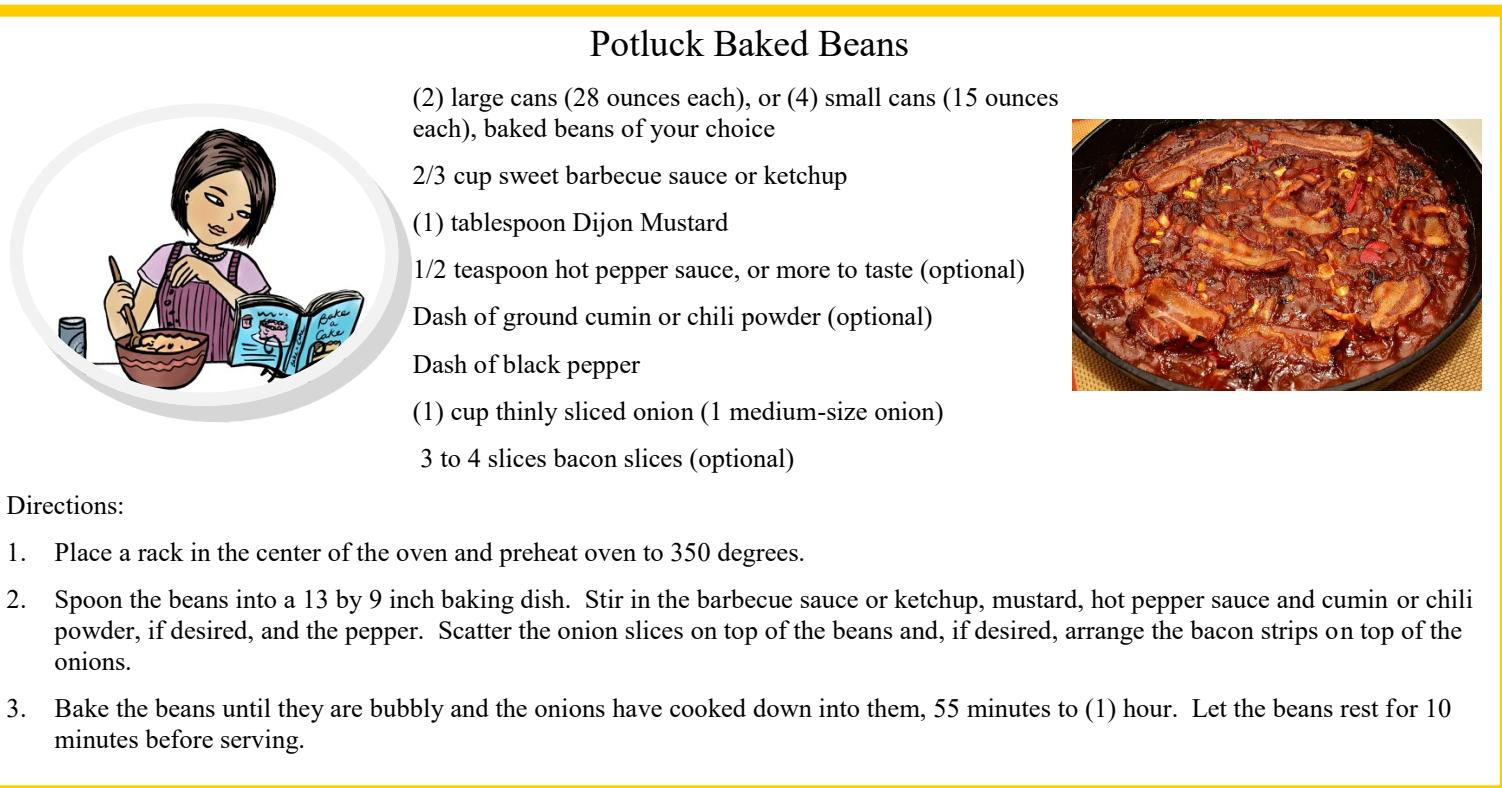
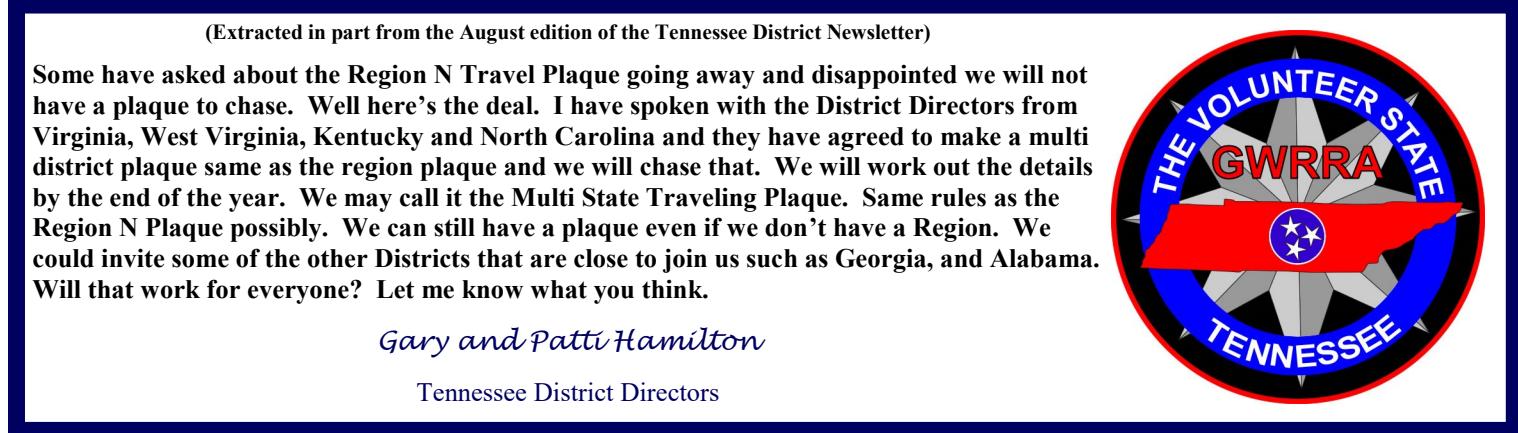
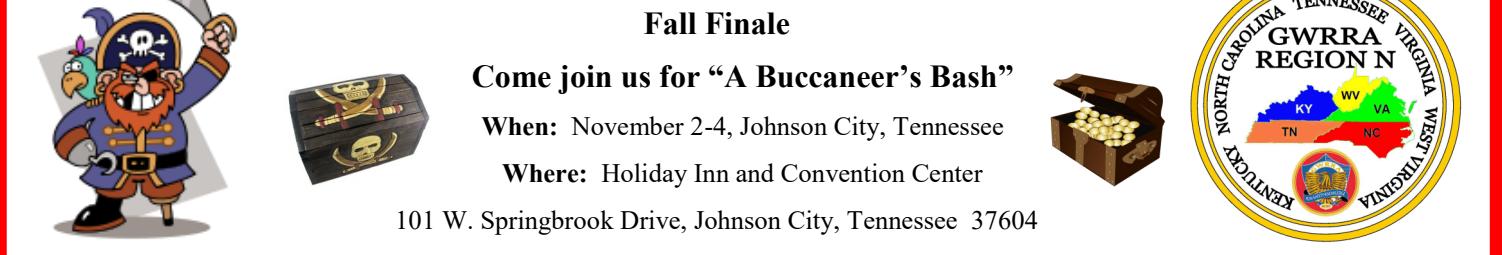
(1) cup thinly sliced onion (1 medium-size onion)

3 to 4 slices bacon slices (optional)



Directions:

1. Place a rack in the center of the oven and preheat oven to 350 degrees.
2. Spoon the beans into a 13 by 9 inch baking dish. Stir in the barbecue sauce or ketchup, mustard, hot pepper sauce and cumin or chili powder, if desired, and the pepper. Scatter the onion slices on top of the beans and, if desired, arrange the bacon strips on top of the onions.
3. Bake the beans until they are bubbly and the onions have cooked down into them, 55 minutes to (1) hour. Let the beans rest for 10 minutes before serving.
